The Need



The forests of Wisconsin's Northwoods are magical, productive, abundant yet finite.

From ancient times to today, the traditions and practices of those who have lived, worked and governed in the Northwoods make our forests what they are today.

Understanding the historical uses of forest resources connects us to the land and to the legacy of those who came before us.

By preserving, sharing and showcasing these stories, images and artifacts, and by directing visitors to actual historical sites in the forest, we become better informed stewards for future generations.

The Objective

Restore and renovate a 90-year-old Civilian Conservation Corps and Youth Conservation Corps building in the heart of the Northern Highland-American Legion State Forest for use as a forest history museum.

The Goals




- Preserve both the building and the stories of the historical uses of Northwoods forests

The Plan



- Restore the building to rustic, historically accurate standards outside and in
- Relocate the building to a prominent site on the Discovery Center campus easily accessible to the public
- Create a series of display areas that tell the story of forest history
- Use actual artifacts, images and digital presentations to create an appropriate theme for each historical period
- Utilize outdoor space for hands-on activities
- Operate as an all-season historical museum




Building History




- (1933-1935) Used as a Civilian Conservation Corps barracks originally located at Palmer Lake near Land O' Lakes, WI
- (1936–1963) Relocated to Rhinelander, WI and used for several purposes ending up as a storage building there
- (1963-1996) Moved to the Statehouse Lake Youth Conservation Corps Camp in Manitowish Waters, WI for use as the PX store and recreation center
- (1996 to present) Used for storage by the North Lakeland Discovery Center, the nonprofit nature center that occupies the former YCC Camp site

The Exhibits

#1 Indigenous Nations

Purpose: Utilized and maintained the forest to create a sustainable place to live and thrive in the natural world

Work:

- Hunting and gathering
- Employing fire to maintain areas for harvest of crops and wild foods
- Sustaining a healthy forest in a natural balance



Legacy:

- Tradition of sustainability in modern forest practices
- Knowledge of important forest food and medicinal products

#2 Logging Era and Early Management

Purpose:

- Provide key timber resources for a growing nation
- Aggressive logging creating cutover land and forest fires
- Government response to restore and protect natural resources

Work:

- Logging, transport, milling of timber
- Forest products
- State and federal forestry departments created to restore the forest
- Fire protection, planting, surveying, law enforcement, tourism

Legacy:

- Scientific forest management to guide future forestry
- Created Wisconsin Department of Forestry, Wisconsin Conservation Commission
- Laws and zoning to encourage government, business, and private landowners to restore forests sustainably
- Indigenous Nations partner with government agencies to restore critical resources

#3 CCC and CCC Indian Division

Purpose: Environmental reclamation and improvement work for men 18 to 25 during the Great Depression

Work:

- Reforestation projects
- Educational opportunities
- Helped build State and National Parks
- Forest fire protection



Legacy:

- Helped young men support their families
- Trained men for lifelong work
- Parks, campsites, forests, and wildlife habitat created

#4 Youth Conservation Corps

Purpose: Summer work experience in conservation for youth 15 to 19

Work:


- Reforestation, improvement, and sustainability projects
- Game and fisheries management

Legacy:

- Built hiking, ski, and snowshoe trails
- Created campsites and remodeled park facilities
- Improved fish and wildlife habitat
- Contributed to fire protection



#5 Forest Management Today



Purpose: Using science and traditional cultural knowledge to manage timber products, recreation, and sustainability.

Work:

- Maximize timber products while embracing science and new technology
- Increased emphasis on recreation in state forest and parks
- Encourage growth of privately owned forests

Legacy:

- WDNR created to manage the forest for multiple stakeholders
- Greatly expanded recreational opportunities
- Greater collaboration between business, Indigenous Nations, private landowners, and government

#6 Rotating Exhibits

Legacy: Display unique uses of forest as a place of history, art, literature and exploration



Examples:

- Forest art exhibitions
- Maple sugar production
- Medicinal plants
- Legends and stories of the forest
- Forest to farms and back
- Cranberry harvest

Project Schedule

2021 - Organization, exhibit planning and preliminary design

2022 - Architecture, exhibit prototypes and budgeting

2023 -24 - Fundraising and events

Fall/winter 2024-25 - Bidding

Spring 2025 – Begin construction

Winter/Spring 2026 - Grand opening!

How the Museum will Operate

- An affiliate organization will be formed under the umbrella of the North Lakeland Discovery Center with its own board, bylaws and memberships.
- The board will govern the museum's operation, creating the annual budget, establish use rules, etc.
- The board will supervise volunteers and Discovery Center staff in maintaining the building and exhibits.
- Finances will be handled through the Discovery Center.

The Budget

Construction: \$250,000

New construction: foundation and crawl space, roof, insulation,

HVAC, electrical, interior walls, windows and doors.

Repairs: Rafter tails, floor finishing, siding

Site work: \$35,000

Demolition, site work and cost to move the building

Exhibits: \$40,000

Architecture/engineering: \$15,000

Campaign costs: \$20,000

Marketing materials, events, credit card fees, etc.

Contingency: \$40,000

Total: \$400,000
